From the Clinic Desk

n January of 2015 after a few months of thought and self-study, I wrote a letter to Davis Whitfield of the NCHSAA stating that it was time for a change in representation of the NCCA on the NCHSAA Board of Directors. As I get older, the one thing that I don't want to be accused of is staying around too long and I felt as if that time was getting closer and closer. So as of the May Board Meeting, Joe Franks will be your representative on the NCHSAA Board of Directors. He will bring a new way of looking at things to the Board and will be an outstanding representative of your interests. But he cannot represent your views if you don't let him know what those views are. His e-mail is jfranks@ nccoach.org and it will be very helpful to him for you to keep him informed of your views on current issues before the Board.

was fortunate enough to serve on the Board for about 15 years and during that time was able to work with some of the giants of high school education and athletics. There were no titles amongst Board Members and everyone was on an equal status and a first name basis. Superintendents, principals athletic directors spoke out for what they believed was right for high school athletics in the state and for the most part they all represented the whole state and not what was good for their particular region. Outsiders who are often critical of board decisions say that all these decisions are based on what brings in more money for NCHSAA. Nothing could be farther from the truth.

s we move toward another Clinic in July, we have already obtained the services of some special clinicians. I am thrilled to announce that Danny Manning will be one of our basketball speakers. He has done an outstanding job at Wake when he wasn't left with a quiver containing lots of ACC Arrows. I am especially proud of what he has accomplished. We also have signed up Shea Ralph former Terry Sanford graduate and present UConn

assistant coach to speak to the women's coaches. She is one of the better players to come out of the state and is excited to be back. In baseball, we are in negotiations with Leo Mazzone, former pitching coach of the Atlanta Braves, to share his knowledge of pitching. He now has three pitchers in the Hall of Fame. In volleyball we have Anne Kordes of Louisville presenting and in softball have Bobby Simpson of Higher Ground Softball returning to speak along with Ashley Chastain who is the pitching coach at the College of Charleston. Mike Litzinger of UNC will be speaking to our swimming coaches. We are in the process of lining up some big names that will come later. We have decided not to include men's or women's lacrosse in the 2015 Clinic. The numbers that we were drawing would not allow us to afford the speakers we were bringing in. We were told that if we had a mandated rules interpretation coaches would come but since the new rules are not out until after the Clinic that wouldn't be possible.

Lacrosse coaches can continue membership or Associate Status but there will not be any Clinic sessions.

√his year's football staff should bring some interesting aspects of coaching to our coaches. The headliner on Thursday will be Dante Scarnecchia, former line coach for the New England Patriots. I doubt that he will wear all five Super Bowl Rings but he has them and is enthusiastic about sharing his knowledge with you. We also have Kenny Browning signed up to speak on Wednesday. Now that he is no longer coaching in college, he made himself available and I'm sure his sessions will be well attended. In wrestling we have Cary Kolat of Campbell University handling the sessions. He has their program heading for the top.

the process of writing this column stretches over a number of weeks and I would be remiss if I didn't mention the passing of Coach Dean

hope a little bragging is ok here. Some of you may have seen that L the country's largest coaches association, the Texas High School Coaches Association, has dropped its all-star games. The cause is the new NCAA regulation essentially prohibiting Division I football coaches from speaking at clinics if an all-star game is also administered by the same coaches association in roughly the same time period. The very reasoned appeal to the NCAA went was denied. Another large association is considering dropping its games because of financial concerns. I want you to know that Mac and I have carefully invested and spent your money and that the NCCA is in excellent financial condition. Also, we are committed to the survival of our games.

he bottom line is that we have no reason to recommend a clinic fee increase and in fact, the board of Directors has recently lowered fees for Associates whose fees are paid with their school's staff during pre-registration. I am worried about our sister organizations who have fallen on harder times but am gratified that our efforts to protect the NCCA have paid off.

I'm also thankful that, in order to protect the clinic, we haven't had to move our football game from it's usual time slot. Though there is absolutely no connection between the clinic and our all-star football game and no contact between clinicians and our players, the NCAA in their usual pompous and overbearing way have precluded Division I coaches from speaking at our football sessions. It matters nothing to the NCAA that

these players are never within five miles of the clinic until game night. There was already a rule in effect that these college coaches could not attend all-star practices or games. We are denied some potentially good clinicians because the NCAA doesn't trust those clinicians; regardless of the fact that those same clinicians could never come into contact with our players. It's ironic that our football players are not Division I signees but basketball and soccer players often are; yet basketball nor soccer has such a draconian NCAA rule.

ac and Joe have been very accommodating in finding excellent clinicians without having to get Division I speakers in football. I greatly appreciate our football coaches for understanding this change in order to keep our game during clinic/all-star

week. The football game has always been the highlight of and culmination for the games and the clinic. I think most coaches agree that as much of everything the NCCA does as possible should be held during All-Star and Clinic week.

ne area of our operations that is of concern to me is our scholarship program. The number of applications has been terribly low the past two years. By the deadline of a March 1 postmark, we had four applicants this year. Fortunately, all four are superior students and involved in many school activities and therefore deserving of scholarships, but our normal selection pool is about 20 candidates. Last year I sent out a reminder of the upcoming deadline by email and had a slew of

Smith. I was fortunate enough to be invited to work the UNC Basketball Camp for a number of years and those times were some of the best of my coaching career. During these times the camp ran from Sunday to Friday and was full for three weeks every year. In fact the staff had proposed that we have a 4th week but not tell anyone at Carolina and split the proceeds. Needless to say that never worked. Coach Smith toured the various gyms and by the middle of the week he knew the names of all the campers. One of the funny stories about camp was when Doug Moe and Larry Brown were running one of the gyms with 48 campers. In order to do things their way, they picked out one of the worst campers and had him be the lookout to warn them when Coach Smith or Coach Guthridge were coming so they could quit the fun things they were doing and run the official camp schedule. If they were ever aware of this strategy, I'm not sure.

ne of the highlights of camp came on Thursday afternoon when the staff got to listen to Coach Smith about basketball. We were thrilled with this and obviously were all ears for any information he would give us. One day in the midst of this session he asked me who brought the ball in-bounds for my team. I was a young coach and basically had never thought about that. I gave him an answer which was satisfactory at the time but this sent me an instant message that if I were ever going to succeed in this profession I was going to have to make sure that even the smallest detail was taken care of. I guess this was the first step in my being accused of overcoaching my team.

s a result of these camp experiences I became a big Dean Smith I I fan and since imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, tried to follow his lead on as many parts of the game as possible. We ran Carolina's zone offense, match-up zone, out of bounds plays and acknowledging the passer who had made the assist. We also tried to make our program a family. The biggest compliment I ever received was when he had seen my team play on a recruiting tape and told me we ran his zone offense better than his team. Of course that wasn't true but it was a good example of how kind he was to everyone. I can't remember ever writing him a letter that I didn't receive a reply. It wasn't always within weeks but it always came with a handwritten note. He wrote me a letter when I retired from coaching and when you think of the demands on his time, that was really special.

hen you think of his final years, it is truly sad that someone with a mind like he had was stricken with loss of memory and awareness. One of the other cherished memories was listening to him talk about a game that happened 20 years before and he knew the score and the time and everything that happened. Being a fairly demonstrative coach in my early years (Lefty foot stomps and tough on officials), I found that the more that I became aware of his presence on the bench and tried to emulate, the better coach I became.

did not have a real close relationship with Coach Smith but he meant a great deal to my career and his passing brought far more sadness to my life than I really deserved to have when compared to those who were close. I know he is in a far better place but I will always be thankful for the impact that he had on my career. How many coaches could have contributed as much to the game and to other coaches than he did. How many times in all levels of basketball can you say that looks like something Dean Smith did?

unqualified candidates so that wasn't helpful. The only qualifications for a student are to have a parent who has completed 15 years of membership in the NCCA and to be a graduating high school senior or graduate student.

ne might question why Mac and I adhere so strictly to the March 1 deadline if we wish for more applicants. I can certainly remember games I'd have won if the horn hadn't sounded when it did. For me, if practice started at 4:00 pm, then a player had to be on the field or court ready to practice at 4:00 sharp or run. There are consequences for missing deadlines. We must have a deadline so we can convene the scholarship committee. If you have a child who is a junior, and a good student, and you will have completed 15 years as a member of the NCCA by next summer; please put January 1, 2016 on your calendar as the beginning of the NCCA Scholarship process and

March 1st as the deadline for mailing. We have a really dedicated and talented scholarship committee and I'd love to see them sweat over a large pool of qualified candidates next year.

want to thank the head coaches in our all-star sports for adapting to L our online nomination process so well. Jeff Becker with Sportzventures has worked hard to keep improving our forms and he has made several changes on short notice. Since I only received less than 10 nominations on paper, next year only online nominations will be accepted. Football had over 400 submitted and the other sports were up in numbers as well. Basketball coaches need to remember that a nomination to the NC/ SC game does not carry over to the East-West game. Final statistics and awards make the East-West submissions much different than the NC/SC ones. All coaches need to refer to their NCCA Directory to make note of the nomination deadlines. I do accept late nominations for about a week so we don't miss a really good player. It's not their fault a coach was negligent. Those late ones are, of course, sent

late to the all-star coaches (who will already be into their deliberations) or given to the coaches as they arrive to send invitations.

n even better aspect of the online process is with the player acceptances. We have cut the time required to complete rosters by a half or better. There are still a few tweaks to be implemented, but overall, we are miles ahead of where we were a few years ago.

im Via, my assistant and our webmaster, will be working to move more and more of our all-star forms online. The biggest hurdle has been to make certain only the proper people use them. I have received a few forms completed online by coaches who I guess want to be all-star coaches. The problem is, the form is there for those who have already been selected as all-star coaches for this year. The link reads "2015 All-Star Coaches Information Form". I'm not sure how to make this clearer.

A bbey Carr from Middle Creek High School won the inaugural All-Star T-Shirt Design Contest. She has received a check for \$200 and will get tickets for her family to any of the East-West All-Star Games. I'd like to make this an annual affair but I need to know there is interest. We need more than a couple of submissions. Please let me know if you want us to continue with this program.

have offered our all-star football coaches a chance to have their marching bands perform at the game but have had no takers. If your school's band would like to perform the national anthem and a 5 minute halftime show, please have someone contact me. We'd love to have two bands and have a contest between an East and a West band. We'll negotiate whether the expense of the bus(es) or a modest fee will be paid. A pep band or two at basketball would also be welcomed.

Remembering Lynda Tamblyn...

The NCCA lost a great friend and loyal worker on November 8, 2014 when the NCCA's Office Manager, Coach Lynda Tamblyn died suddenly. Those who had reason to visit our office or speak with her on the phone will remember Lynda as a friendly, helpful person.

Lynda was her Oklahoma high school's top female athlete and was a graduate of the University of Oklahoma and UNC-Greensboro.

Her passions for teaching, coaching, and her students was evidenced by her 30 years of perfect attendance; primarily at Grimsley High School. She was selected eight times as Conference Girl's Tennis Coach of the Year. She was the first woman to be granted lifetime membership in the North Carolina Coaches Association and for the past twenty-four years had used her extraordinary intelligence and attention to detail as Office Manager, Treasurer, newsletter editor, and "Jill of all trades" for the North Carolina

Coaches Association. A skilled writer and editor, Lynda co-authored a book entitled "See Jane Not Run: Teachers are Leaders". Joe Franks nicknamed her "LT Grammar" for her careful editing of our columns and most other written communications from this office.

Lynda was a passionately active member at the local, state, and international levels of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, an organization of key women educators, and was frequently consulted on parliamentary and financial issues. Delta Kappa Gamma recognized her contributions with a North Carolina International Star of the Southeast Award in July, 2014.

She attended the First Christian Church of Greensboro, where, at various times, she served as elder, trustee, and treasurer.

Lynda's friends will remember the glint in her eye when exchanging greetings and her keen sense of humor. Fiercely loyal, any slight Lynda perceived directed at one of her friends, her family, her alma mater (the University of Oklahoma), or Grimsley High School would provoke a noticeable, negative reaction. Most of all, Lynda is remembered for her talents and her unselfishness as a team player who excelled behind the scenes; never seeming to care for public acclaim for her group's accomplishments.

To honor Lynda and recognizing her commitment to the NCCA, her brother Ken Tamblyn has proposed establishing and funding a new scholarship for 2016. This scholarship will be endowed sufficiently to yield several thousand dollars yearly to our most outstanding applicant.

They Still Call Me "Coach"



"Being consistent will help to build a program."

NC Coach (NCC): What sport(s) did you coach?

HG: I was a football head coach for 21 years, coached wrestling for 7 years, golf for 22 years. I was a School Athletic Director for 21 years.

NCC: Where (at which schools) did you coach?

HG: Northern Durham for 7 years and T. Wingate Andrews for 16 years.

NCC: Are you still involved in coaching and/or athletics?

HG: Yes – While not actively coaching, I serve on the Board of Directors of the Corrigan/Faircloth Chapter of the National Football Foundation, the Guilford County Sports Hall of Fame and the Greensboro Sports Council. I am also a member of the Tournament Host Committee of the Tournament Hosts of Greensboro.

NCC: What is your most memorable coaching experience?

HG: So many positive memories. I was very fortunate to work with outstanding athletes, assistant coaches and administrators during my entire coaching career. I value the friendships and associations made with so many coaches and Athletic Directors that still continue to the present. It is rewarding to be approached by so many former players and students expressing their appreciation for the associations we may have encountered. I fondly remember State Football Championships won in 1976 and in 1991 - the results of lots of hard work.

Herb Goins

Herb Goins is a native of Charlotte, an Eagle Scout and graduated from Myers Park High in 1964. At Myers Park, he was MVP in football and played in the East-West All-Star game. Herb graduated from Duke in 1969 where he was a 3-year letterman and 2 year starter at guard for the Blue Devils. He received his M.Ed. from UNC-Chapel Hill in 1973.

He enjoyed a career of almost 40 years in public school athletics in North Carolina. Herb's teaching (History) and coaching career spanned 23 years at Northern Durham and T. Wingate Andrews in High Point. In 21 years as a head coach, his football teams were 169-73-4, won 15 Conference championships and appeared in the State Playoffs 17 times. His football teams at Andrews won 2 State Championships, 4-A in 1976 and 3-A in 1991. Herb served as an assistant coach in the East-West All-Star game and the Shrine Bowl and served as Head Coach of NC in the 1985 Shrine Bowl

Herb was an Athletic Director for 37 years. While coaching, he was also school AD for 20 years at both Northern Durham and Andrews. He was a district-wide AD for High Point Public Schools for 2 years, Durham Public Schools for 3 years, and completed the last 12 years of his career as Athletic Director for the Guilford County Schools from which he retired in 2008.

Herb served on the Board of Directors of the NC Athletic Directors Association from 2001-2004 and was President in 2003-04. He was President of the NC City-County ADs from 2002-2004. Athletic honors received include the Lifetime Achievement Award from the NCADA in 2008 and Honorary Member Award from the from the NC Football Coaches Association, also in 2008. Herb was inducted into the Guilford County Sports Hall of Fame in 2011 and the NC Athletic Directors Hall of Fame in 2012. The Field House at A.J. Simeon Stadium in High Point was named in Herb's honor in 2012.

Herb is currently an active volunteer in many sports-related groups. He serves as Treasurer of thre Corrigan/Faircloth Chapter of the National Football Foundation and was President of the group from 2001-2008. He is a member of and serves on the Board of Directors of the Greensboro Sports Council. He also is a member of the Tournament Host Committee of Greensboro which assists in hosting sporting events in Greensboro including ACC basketball tournaments.

He and his wife Lindy have been married 45 years and have 3 married children -- Lee, John and Sarah - and currently 5 grandchildren. He is an active member of St. Mary's Episcopal Church in High Point where he has served on the Vestry, Building Committee and 22 years as Acolyte training and scheduling chairman.

NCC: What part of coaching was the most rewarding for you?

HG: All aspects of coaching – from working with the kids, interacting with assistant coaches, preparation for practices and games (yes – even the lengthy Sunday staff meetings during the season!), the anticipation of the big game. While there may have been many difficult days and some disappointments, the overall coaching career I enjoyed was positive. I feel fortunate to have been a high school head football coach.

NCC: Why did you go into coaching?

HG: I was probably destined to coach. My father was a high school and junior high coach while I was growing up in Charlotte. It was natural to go to high school games on Fridays. I developed a love of the game and was fortunate enough

to have played in both high school and college. It just seemed to be the natural thing to do.

NCC: What is your funniest coaching memory?

HG: As time expired in a 1985 playoff game with Williams, our punt returner returned a punt for a touchdown to send the game into overtime. During the play, a Williams player had been knocked into one of our coaches during the return. His helmet hit our coach's head, temporarily knocking him unconscious. As we turned back to the bench to prepare for overtime, everyone noticed the unconscious coach. We all thought he had suffered a heart attack with the thrilling ending to send the game into overtime. As we attended to the coach who was starting to come around, but still lying on the ground, one of our

coaches said to him – "Coach, don't die yet, we're going into overtime!" The coach recovered, but we still laugh about the situation to this day.

NCC: What was your most embarrassing coaching moment?

HG: My most embarrassing moment is that I can't remember any really embarrassing moment. I'll blame that on my advancing age. I'm sure I had plenty of embarrassing moments.

NCC: What was your favorite play or strategy?

HG: As a run-oriented coach, it was the off-tackle play out of the I and power I formations. At Andrews, we were generally blessed with strong offensive lineman and fullbacks, so this proved to be our "bread and butter". We had many different blocking schemes for the off-tackle play and developed an effective play-action passing series off of T.

NCC: Who had the toughest teams you coached against?

HG: Marion Kirby-coached Page HS teams and Sam Story-coached Williams HS teams. They were always very difficult to prepare for and beat.

NCC: What change(s) would you make to the current rules in your sport?

HG: I like the rule changes that have gone into protecting the long snapper in both the punting and place kicking phases of the game. I also like the emphasis currently being placed on taking the "head" out of blocking and tackling due to the nature of concussions.

NCC: What one piece of advice would you give a beginning coach?

HG: Learn all you can by attending clinics and develop your own personal philosophy of coaching as quickly as you can. Be open to changes, but not so many that it changes your personal philosophy to any great extent. Being consistent will help to build a program.

NCC: What are the most important things for young coaches to do in dealing with:

a. athletes – b. parents

HG: Be open with athletes and parents. Tell them where they stand even

if it is not what they want to hear. Do not be hesitant in applying discipline to your players.

c. administrators – d. ADs

HG: Keep administrators and athletic directors in the loop, particularly with problems or discipline issues that may develop on your team. These folks do not want to be blindsided.

e. other coaches -

HG: Select the best assistant coaches you can and delegate responsibility to them. Let them coach and be willing to accept their input as long as it fits in with your philosophy.

f. the press/media -

HG: Be cordial and accommodating

and return phone calls and inquiries. You don't have to give away game plans and secrets but respond positively to their questions. After a game, be "cool" and don't get caught up in the heat of the moment in answering a question with an answer you may later regret making.

NCC: What did/does the NCCA mean to you?

HG: During my coaching years, the NCCA provided the yearly clinic with wonderful clinicians that provided many valuable ideas and suggestions for the sport of football. During my retired years, it provides the oppor-

tunity for associations with former colleagues. I especially enjoy the retirees luncheon put on every year by the NCCA.

NCC: Other comments would you like to share with our members:

HG: Be yourself, don't try to be or intimidate someone you aren't or can't be. Never overlook the value of a supportive spouse. I was and still am fortunate to have a wife that participated in and supported everything I did as a coach. This enabled coaching to become a family endeavor and was a great reason for me enjoying my


